Overview

This resource pack includes examples of global health actors—institutions, organizations, and alliances—that operate within our increasingly complex global health system.

Sometimes these actors are categorized as (1) those whose primary intent is to improve health, such as the World Health Organization (WHO), or (2) those that influence health, such as the World Trade Organization (WTO), or are relevant to health, such as the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO).

In this resource pack, however, we classify actors by “type” and include examples in the following major categories: (1) **United Nations (U.N.) System**, which includes programs and funds (e.g., U.N. Children’s Fund [UNICEF], specialized agencies (e.g., WHO), other entities and bodies (e.g., Joint United Nations Programme on HIV/AIDS [UNAIDS], United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees [UNHCR], etc., and their affiliates); (2) **Global Alliances and Public-Private Partnerships** (e.g., Global Fund to Fight Aids, Tuberculosis and Malaria, GAVI Alliance, etc.); (3) **Non-Governmental Organizations and Civil Society** (e.g., International Red Cross, Doctors Without Borders, CARE, and Human Rights Watch); (4) **Philanthropic Organizations** (e.g., Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation); and (5) **Others**, such as organizations focused on research, data analysis, and/or policy (e.g., IHME, PRB, RAND, Council on Foreign Relations, etc.).

Note that we did not include national governments, with their specialized health ministries, departments, or agencies, and bilateral development agencies, which are part of the broader “global health system.” We also acknowledge that there are additional civil society organizations, multinational corporations, and academic institutions that are not included here, but serve as part of the “global health landscape.”

Overview

This collection is one of several included in our [Resource Pack: Core Global Health Organizations](#), which includes examples of global health actors (i.e., institutions, organizations, and alliances) that operate within our increasingly complex global health system. It is intended to support teaching and learning about global governance (i.e., the ways we tackle transnational health issues in a globalized and interdependent world, including how institutional actors, organizational structures, and policy making processes play a role).

This collection focuses specifically on Global Alliances & Public-Private Partnerships. In addition to the programs, agencies, and organizations within the United Nations System, non-governmental organizations, and private foundations, complex global health challenges have led to innovative global alliances and hybrid organizations. Sometimes referred to as public-private partnerships, they are generally governed by representatives from both inside and outside national governments and often include civil society representatives.

Examples include the GAVI Alliance (formerly the Global Alliance for Vaccines and Immunization), UNITAID (which works to improve the functioning of global markets for commodities for acquired immunodeficiency syndrome [AIDS], tuberculosis, and malaria), and the Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis, and Malaria. Other examples include concerted efforts to reduce the global burden of a specific infectious disease (e.g., the Global Polio Eradication Initiative Organization, Roll Back Malaria Partnership to End Malaria, and the Stop TB Partnership), or efforts to develop affordable and accessible therapeutics (e.g., Medicines for Malaria Venture and the Global Alliance for TB Drug Development).

Gavi: The Vaccine Alliance is a global health partnership focused on vaccinating the world's children against infectious diseases. Gavi is a partnership across the private and public sectors, including with the World Health Organization and the United Nations Children's Fund, that provides immunizations to children in the poorest countries, gives strategic direction, informs policy-making, and helps to boost economies of low-income countries for sustainable health outcomes for children. Gavi's five-year strategy, Gavi 5.0 from 2021-2025 aims to increase efficacy and efficiency of immunization delivery, improve sustainability of immunization programs, and ensure that no children are left behind.

Gavi provides a [portal](#) detailing the countries it supports as well as [information](#) about its programming and impact. It publishes [annual progress reports](#) of the overview of Gavi's work and performance, other [publications](#) including progress reports, technical updates, and fact sheets, and has an extensive [multi-media library](#) that includes a [media room](#) with the latest press releases and news headlines.

The Food Security Information Network (FSIN) is a global information sharing platform co-funded by the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations, World Food Programme, and International Food Policy Research Institute focused on using data to shape policies, projects, decision-making, and programs to reduce poverty and end hunger and malnutrition. The FSIN works with 16 global and regional partners to build collaborations between government institutions and development partners to create and reform food security information systems, improve availability and quality of food security analysis, and advocate for evidence-based food and nutrition decisions and policies.

The FSIN primarily emphasizes using [data analytics](#) to produce and promote timely information, global reports and analyses, and strategic initiatives that can strengthen responses to food crises and inform preventing crises. The FSIN also works on [resilience measurement](#) of its programs and decision-making progress on the country- and regional level. The organization works with local institutions and governments to help provide resilience measurement and technical advice. The FSIN offers a [resource portal](#) containing reports, strategy and policy documents, infographics, maps, evaluations, and other resources related to their work and impact. It also publishes [up-to-date news](#) on issues relevant to the FSIN and offers [online trainings](#) for professionals or organizations to use the tools and methods of the FSIN

The Roll Back Malaria (RBM) to End Malaria is a global partnership established in 1998 by the United Nations Children's Fund, the World Health Organization, the United Nations Development Program, and the World Bank. The partnership seeks to catalyze support for malaria control and elimination and rally partners around a joint plan of action to fight the disease. The RBM partnership engages with over 500 partners ranging from community health worker groups to researchers, businesses, and international organizations.

RBM publishes and hosts [reports and other publications](#), portals for [news](#) and [events](#), a [portal providing information on malaria](#), and [toolkits](#) for those interested in malaria advocacy work.

The Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria is an international partnership organization focused on ending the epidemics of AIDS, tuberculosis, and malaria. The Global Fund strategically invests more than \$4 billion each year to support programs in over 100 countries in partnership with local governments, civil society, technical agencies, the private sector, and groups of people affected by these diseases. It aims to build sustainable health systems across sectors to respond to diseases by first allowing countries to make their own major investment decisions for their communities and later providing oversight and approval for effective programs. The Global Fund prioritizes prevention, treatment, and care services and hopes to strengthen health systems, improve economies, and coordinate scientific innovation with the private sector.

The Global Fund provides an [interactive data explorer](#) showing locations, grants, results and additional resources in places where it works; the [data service portal](#) offers downloadable data files and data sets related to grants and disbursements; the [digital library](#) includes photos, videos, and illustrations showing the impacts of the Global Fund-supported health programs across the world. The Global Fund also produces [major publications](#) related to its operations and results. The Global Fund maintains a [news stories portal](#), [feature stories](#), and updates about [pressing issues in global health](#).

UNITAID is engaged in finding new ways to prevent, treat and diagnose HIV/AIDS, tuberculosis, and malaria. The organization provides short-term financial grants to put health solutions and innovations into practice that have the potential to alleviate the burden of these diseases. The funding for these grants is provided by governments and non-governmental organizations alike.

The Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI) works around the world with the goal of eradicating all types of polio, from wild to vaccine-related as well as Sabin polioviruses. The organization was founded in 1988 after the World Health Organization passed a resolution making the elimination of polio a global priority. GPEI is a public-private partnership led by national governments with five partners – the World Health Organization (WHO), Rotary International, the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the United Nations Children's Fund, and the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation. GPEI's current countries of focus are Afghanistan, Nigeria, and Pakistan.

The TB Alliance, formerly known as the Global Alliance for TB Drug Development, is a not-for-profit organization focused on advancing TB drug development and delivering improved, affordable tuberculosis treatments for those who need them worldwide. As a product development partnership, TB Alliance builds partnerships across public, private, academic, and philanthropic sectors to optimize and drive the development of new TB drugs and products. TB Alliance aims to develop faster-acting tuberculosis drugs that are accessible to all people who need them.

TB Alliance mainly works in [research and development](#), managing the largest pipeline of new TB drugs in history. The site includes specific [data on the importance of new TB drugs](#), a [news portal](#) with the latest news, [publications](#), and a portal that contains videos and patient stories from the global TB community.

Medicines for Malaria Venture (MMV) is a product development partnership in antimalarial drug research and development. Founded in 1999, MMV operates as a public-private partnership that manages a portfolio of over 65 projects related to antimalarial research. MMV develops and facilitates the delivery of effective, affordable antimalarial drugs to reduce the burden of malaria in countries worldwide.

MMV engages primarily in [research and development](#), as well as [access and product management](#), to ensure the availability and reach of antimalarial drugs. The MMV site provides comprehensive [statistics and figures about malaria](#), malaria treatment, and the history of antimalarial drugs, along with a [news portal](#) consisting of news articles, interviews, infographics, and other relevant publications.

PMNCH works across three focus areas; [maternal, newborn and child health](#), [sexual and reproductive health and rights](#), and [adolescent health and well-being](#). The site produces a comprehensive [resource portal](#), which includes multimedia resources, thematic toolkits around key topics, such as COVID-19 and women and children's health, and relevant publications.

The Stop TB Partnership is a global partnership comprised of over 2,000 country, regional, and global partners committed to eliminating tuberculosis as a public health problem by 2030. Founded in 2001 and hosted by the United Nations, the Stop TB Partnership facilitates collaboration with partners drawn from global and technical organizations, government programs, research agencies, and community groups to develop and implement new innovative tools, facilitate access to TB diagnostics and drugs, and engage in advocacy and capacity building efforts. The partnership aims to ensure everyone with TB has access to effective treatments and to ultimately stop the transmission of tuberculosis globally.

The Stop TB Partnership engages in various [global advocacy efforts and campaigns](#) to increase visibility of tuberculosis and TB-impacted communities, along with key efforts in [community, human rights, and gender responses to TB](#). The site produces numerous resources, including [interactive tuberculosis data dashboards](#) where users can explore country-level data for tuberculosis, a resource portal on [TB and COVID-19](#), and a portal with relevant [publications and reports](#).

It includes major international organizations that have broad mandates across global health and social challenges and crises (e.g., International Committee of the Red Cross, Doctors Without Borders, CARE, and Human Rights Watch) and/or focus on specific thematic areas, from reproductive health (e.g., Marie Stopes International, Guttmacher Institute, Center for Reproductive Rights, etc.) to hunger/food security/food policy (e.g., OXFAM, International Food Policy Research Institute) to global road safety (FIA Foundation).

While not international in scope, this collection also includes examples of non-governmental organizations that conduct research, data analysis, and policy work relevant to global health such as the Population Reference Bureau, The Graduate Institute of International and Development Studies, the Global Health Programme, Chatham House - The Royal Institute of International Affairs, the Council on Foreign Relations, the Pew Research Center, the Results for Development Institute, the RAND Corporation, and the Center for Global Development.

Oxfam International is a global nonprofit organization focused on ending poverty and improving social justice around the world, specifically working in over 90 countries and reaching tens of millions of people. Oxfam provides grants to and partners with local organizations in the countries and regions where it works to support long-term solutions for communities. It also is an advocate for systems, policies, and practices to remove structural causes of poverty and inequality, as well as in the areas of climate justice, gender equality, food inequity, and more. Oxfam also coordinates humanitarian responses to provide immediate relief during times of conflict and disaster.

CARE works in over 100 countries and focuses on initiatives including women's empowerment, community-based health programs, food security, and early education. CARE responds to global emergencies and disasters—environmental, violent, refugee—with both immediate relief and long-term, comprehensive recovery programs. It also works with Congress as an advocate to inform legislation and policy changes related to poverty and social justice, aiming to address the underlying causes of poverty.

CARE provides a map showing its work locations and a [list of emergencies](#) where it responds to disasters and relief programs each year. CARE also produces an [annual report](#) detailing progress and impact. Other resources available to users include technical briefs; evaluations and research; policy papers; and other tools. CARE also supports a [newsroom](#) with press releases and articles relevant to CARE's work.

Marie Stopes International is an international non-profit organization focusing on reproductive health and providing contraceptives and safe abortion services around the world. Marie Stopes works to provide family planning services to the 214 million women and girls, mostly in poor and vulnerable communities, who have no reliable way of preventing

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unintended pregnancy. The organization works in 37 countries across the world, offering a full range of contraceptive services, safe abortion, and post-abortion care, as well as maternal health planning and care—including prenatal and obstetric care and access to trained birth attendants. Marie Stopes conducts outreach, operates more than 600 centers internationally, partners with private health providers to deliver high-quality services, mobilizes midwives, and works on policy and advocacy work for government health system strengthening. They hope to support women in taking control of their own lives, fertility, futures, and choices, which further drives economic and social development in nations around the world.

Marie Stopes International publishes research reports, guidance, and fact sheets about their work. Their topics cover safe abortion and abortion care, climate, outreach, contraception, maternal health, STIs and HIV, refugees and internally displaced persons, humanitarian situations, male family planning, policy and advocacy. They offer research documents, facts sheets, reports, and graphs and infographics. All of their resources are available through one [resource portal](#) and can be filtered by topic, resource type, keyword, and year. The organization also maintains [The Spotlight Blog](#) on their sexual and reproductive health work, stories, and case studies. Users can also learn about Marie Stopes' [philanthropy work](#) and find additional resources through the [media center](#).

UHC2030 is the global movement for strengthening health systems and achieving universal health coverage (UHC). UHC2030 advocates for a shared commitment to UHC and for accountability, promotes development cooperation, and works to share and create knowledge on strengthening health systems through frameworks, proposals and recommendations, and coordinated efforts across sectors. UHC2030's mission encompasses four major objectives: improving coordination of health system strengthening (HSS) efforts, strengthening policy efforts with multiple stakeholders and adhering to principles for external assistance, hold stakeholders and countries accountable for progress, and build momentum towards a shared global vision of HSS for UHC. They strive to build health systems that are sustainable, equitable, and resilient.

UHC2030 focuses its work around four primary areas: [Voices](#) includes diverse voices for ensuring advocacy, accountability, and engagement from civil society and the private sector; [the Working Better Together](#) initiative focuses on HSS, technical working groups, health emergencies, and country compacts; [Knowledge and Networks](#) is the core of knowledge exchange and learning about lessons, experiences, and collaborative approaches to global health systems; the [UHC Data Portal](#) synthesizes data to provide accurate and accessible information on monitoring progress and holding governments accountable.

MHTF ensures health practitioners, policy makers, researchers, and advocates have reliable maternal health information and evidence; identifies and creates opportunities for the maternal health community; generates new evidence for program and policy development; and trains and mentors the next generation of maternal health leaders.

The Maternal Health Task Force focuses on a wide variety of [maternal health topics](#), including: [antenatal and postnatal care](#), [contraception and family planning](#), [disease and maternal health](#), [innovations in maternal health](#), [maternal health care systems](#), [the perinatal period](#), [social determinants of maternal health](#), and [sustainable development goals for maternal mortality](#).

MHTF provides [reports, toolkits, policy briefs, and other documents](#) on maternal health topics. Included in these documents are World Health Organization (WHO) recommendations and handbooks for providers. Additional tools offered by the task force are [online courses](#) and an [Obstetric Emergency Drills Training Kit](#). The online courses are often created by other maternal and global health institutions and cover a vast array of maternal health concerns – from mother-to-child transmission of HIV to managing postpartum hemorrhage. The Obstetric Emergency Drills Training Kit was jointly developed by Argentina’s Institute for Clinical Effectiveness and Health Policy and the Maternal Health Task Force and focuses on postpartum hemorrhage and eclampsia. The International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) is a humanitarian organization dedicated to helping people affected by conflict and armed violence around the world. It responds to emergencies and promotes the implementation of international humanitarian law to ensure the health and human rights of victims of war and violence. It aims to protect the lives of affected populations, strengthen law and humanitarian principles, and apply the seven principles of humanity, impartiality, neutrality, independence, voluntary service, unity, and universality in its work.

The ICRC works in over [100 countries](#) but has key operations in several countries and territories including the Central African Republic, the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Iraq, Lake Chad, Myanmar, South Sudan, Syria, and Yemen. The ICRC takes action in response to disasters, emergencies, and conflict zones and focuses on several areas of health and human rights: [sexual violence](#), [climate change and conflict](#), [economic security](#), [enabling people with disabilities and physical rehabilitation](#), [support for migrants, refugees, and asylum seekers](#), and [water and habitat](#). A primary focus of the ICRC is implementing [international humanitarian law](#) (IHL), treaties, and policies to support the people it protects. Users can read more about war and law and other focus areas of the ICRC in its [resource portal](#). The ICRC publishes reports, articles, and photo and video galleries in its portal. IHME makes this information freely available so that policymakers have the evidence they need to make informed decisions about how to allocate resources to improve population health. Guiding everything that IHME does are five principles: scientific excellence, policy relevance, impartiality, collaboration, and knowledge sharing. Publicly available resources include [data visualizations and interactives](#), [policy reports](#), [research articles](#), [infographics](#), presentations, and several databases, including the [GBD Results Tool](#), which allows users to search data from the Global Burden of Disease (GBD) study. IHME publishes [country profiles](#) that provide an overview of findings from the GBD study, including information about mortality, morbidity, and disability as well as health care access, quality, and spending. Profiles are based on more than 80,000 different data sources used by researchers to produce the most scientifically rigorous estimates possible, and may be freely downloaded and distributed. IHME also provides information on featured health topics and has a [news portal](#) for the latest IHME research.

The Internal Displacement Monitoring Centre gathers data and information through thousands of published articles and UN and government reports, as well as through satellite imagery analysis.

IDMC publishes an annual flagship report entitled [The Global Report on Internal Displacement](#). The report features displacement spotlights and up-to-date global and regional displacement figures. In addition to this main publication, the organization also produces [themed research papers](#) exploring different areas and dimensions of internal

displacement. - U.N. Specialized Agencies are autonomous international organizations working with the UN through negotiated agreements. The most important of these is the World Health Organization (WHO), but other examples relevant to health include the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO), the International Labor Organization (ILO), the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO), the World Intellectual Property Organization (WPO), and the World Bank and the International Monetary Fund (IMF).
- Other Entities and Bodies. Examples relevant to health include Joint United Nations Programme on HIV/AIDS (UNAIDS) and the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR).
- Related Organizations and Affiliates. Examples relevant to health include the International Organization for Migration, UNFCCC Secretariat (UN Climate Change), and the World Trade Organization.

The UNHCR works in over 130 countries around the world and partners with governments to uphold the 1951 Refugee Convention, which defines refugees, the rights of displaced people, and legal obligations of states to protect these groups around the world. Most of the UNHCR's work is mobilizing human, material, and financial resources as part of their humanitarian response to global emergencies threatening displaced peoples. The Burundi situation, Iraq emergency, South Sudan emergency, and Central African Republic situation are examples of emergencies where UNHCR offers support and intervention.

The UNHCR also uses cash-based interventions to provide protection and assistance for access to food, water, healthcare, and shelter, and creates coordinated responses to crises. Other forms of interventions include educational initiatives, climate change and sustainability, and economic inclusion. The UNHCR maintains a [media center](#) with news releases, videos, photos, and stories; the [Refworld database](#) with interactive resources, case laws, and country information; and a [data portal](#).

Refworld works to offer a streamlined and accessible approach to finding relevant protection and legal information.

Refworld allows users to search for and find information easily, with resources organized by topic and keyword, by region, by publisher, or by document type. Its UNHCR portal includes [country positions](#), [policies](#), and [thematic guidelines](#). Refworld offers a [comprehensive legal collection](#) designed as a tool for promoting international law related to refugees, asylum seekers, stateless persons, and other persons of concern to UNHCR; it includes documents and jurisdictions, international judgments and decisions from the United Nations, regional courts, and the European Court of Human Rights, state parties reports, training manuals, and more. Users can also use a search tool in a [case law portal](#) and can browse case laws by country, topic, judicial body, and legal instrument. UNESCO accomplishes these tasks through partnerships with governments and international organizations, and through its field offices.

The United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization produces an annual flagship report, the [Global Education Monitoring Report](#), which assesses global progress toward the Sustainable Development Goal on education (SDG 4) and its 10 targets. The organization provides a [publications repository](#), which allows online access to UNESCO global reports and open access materials from the organization. Additionally, UNESCO hosts a [data portal](#), where the user can select from a list of indicators and view the data in table format. The themes that UNESCO follows can be viewed from the [theme portal](#) and [country profiles](#)—also provided with data related to education, literacy, science, technology, innovation, and culture. In addition to the wide variety of resources UNESCO provides, the organization also posts regular updates in its [news portal](#).
